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"More ancient than the Golden Fleece or Roman Eagle; more honorable," etc. This cannot be applied to the linen or cotton apron, and other cheap and shabby regalia, nor can such substitutes ever look becoming or proper in the lodge room or in a procession.

An organization that claims to be, and is, the grandest and most ancient Order under the Sun, is watched not only by its friends, but by the skeptical and prejudiced, and when its members parade in public, they are judged principally by their appearance—their regalia or uniforms; and when such a procession is seen wearing cheap and shabby regalia, it is likely to challenge adverse criticism, not only on that particular procession, but on the Order to which it belongs; for the public very naturally concludes, that where so little pride and interest is shown there is but little to be proud of or interested in. So in the lodge room where proper regalia is not used, a sense of their shabby appearance always mars the enjoyment of the members, especially if they have for visitors, members of more ambitious lodges. In striking contrast with this are the lodges where emulation reigns, where, by a small additional expense, a fine appearance is made, both in the lodge room and in public procession—challenging the admiration of spectators and silencing criticism.
